Catholic Life and Mission

'When Jesus is asked which is the greatest commandment, the answer is the same in all three of the Gospels in which the question is asked: to love God with all your mind, heart, soul and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself.' This call to love is at the heart of the educational mission of every Catholic school. It is a mission that is clearly echoed in the Second Vatican Council which teaches that the purpose of an education that is distinctively Christian is threefold (Gravissimum Educationis 2):

- to ensure that all pupils understand the faith that gives the school its identity as a Catholic school
- to ensure that all are invited to learn how to worship God in spirit and truth through the prayer and liturgy of the Church
- the formation of all to live in conformity with the pattern of human goodness, truth and justice that we find in Jesus Christ. That is, all pupils in Catholic schools are called to know God more clearly, to love him more dearly and to follow him more nearly every day.'

This threefold mission is reflected in the three perspectives of the Catholic School framework. Through religious education pupils are invited to love God with all their mind, through collective worship with all their heart, soul and strength and through the Catholic life and mission of the school to love their neighbour as themselves.

This policy on Catholic life and mission complements the Religious Education policy, the Prayer and Liturgy policy and the Relationships, Health and Sex Education policy of the Trust.

The aim of this policy is to show how faithfully schools within the Little Way Catholic Educational Trust respond to the call to live as a Catholic community at the service of the Church's educational mission.

Trust Mission Statement

Our Trust family is united in its shared mission to develop our Catholic ethos in order to transform the lives of every child, family and community we serve, in Jesus' name.

Our vision is to empower every child to excel academically, socially, morally, culturally and spirituality in order that they may flourish as individuals. Assured of the love of God, we strive to educate children within an inclusive and compassionate community which celebrates the gifts and talents of our pupils and removes barriers to learning. We strive to be a community of life-long learners, contributing to a just and loving society.

Our Trust family is a partnership of equals who work collaboratively so that everyone can grow and learn together. We celebrate the diversity of our schools, retaining our individual characteristics, whilst working together for the greater good of our whole community.

Through honesty, respect, service and solidarity we value each other as one family.

All are welcome.

Each individual school also has their own Mission Statement which is highly visible throughout the school environment. It clearly reflects each school's role in the educational mission of the Church, promoting Gospel values and the teachings of the Catholic Church.

These mission statements are a touchstone of school life in each Trust school so that:

- Pupils have a clear understanding of its meaning and can articulate this at an age-appropriate level
- All staff embrace and implement the statement across daily school life through a range of opportunities such as class prayers, whole school liturgical prayers, displays, celebration of talents and ensuring a feeling of belonging.
- It is shared with parents and the wider community through school signage, newsletters, policy documents and the website.

School Environment

Visitors to each Trust school are aware of the distinctive Catholic nature of the school through the physical environment, the presence of images and symbols and the recognition of a learning environment that respects the human dignity of all persons as made in God's image and likeness.

At each of our Trust schools, every effort is made to provide a spiritually uplifting, stimulating and aesthetically pleasing environment and so you will also find that:

• All rooms have a crucifix

- All classrooms have a cared for, attractive prayer area matching the liturgical season and including a focal point with interactivity
- There is a display to help the children know who our Pope and Bishop is
- All rooms have the school Mission Statement visible
- All classrooms have the Trust motto visible: Little Acts, Great Love, Big Difference
- Displays in the school show activities of the pupil leadership groups including: council, chaplaincy team, eco groups and different mission groups
- Displays within each classroom reflect the Religious Education Directory Branch being taught, the liturgical season, work produced by the pupils, key prayers/scripture and key vocabulary
- There are statues, icons, pictures of saints that are special to the school
- Signage outside shows that it is a Catholic school

Catholic Curriculum

'The Catholic vision of education is distinctive and the beliefs it holds, the values and aspirations it has must inspire the whole of the curriculum.'¹

Each of our Trust schools is a community of learning with a distinctive educational philosophy which is based on the Gospels. Whilst Religious Education is at the core of the core curriculum, this philosophy permeates all of the curriculum and activities as we recognise the needs of each individual member of the community in each of our schools.

At an age-appropriate level children are introduced to the principles of Catholic Social Teaching. Our schools use child friendly resources to explore the writings of Pope Francis, such as Laudato Si' and Fratelli Tutti. In this way we are building their moral compass and enabling them to respond to social, moral and ethical issues in the world. Our Catholic curriculum leads our charitable outreach and work for social justice.

Relationships, Health and Sex Education is taught in a Catholic context recognising we are all made in God's image and likeness. See the LWCET RHSE Policy.

Other faiths are taught as part of the RE curriculum. See the RE policy of each school. Learning about the religion and cultures of those who do not share the Catholic faith is one of the ways in which Catholic schools embody the call to love one's neighbour. It prepares our children for life in modern Britain, giving them an understanding of the beliefs of others.

Charitable outreach

Our Trust schools aim to foster and develop an awareness of the needs of others: locally, nationally and globally, and promote a spirit of generosity and compassion as taught by Jesus Christ. Through timetabled work on Catholic Social Teaching and Fratelli Tutti pupils are taught to stand in solidarity with the poor and vulnerable.

There are various fundraising events and charitable outreach activities throughout the year co-ordinated by the Chaplaincy Teams within the schools including but not limited to:

- Bringing food in for local foodbanks
- Selling poppies for Remembrance
- Collecting gifts for those less fortunate during Advent
- Raising funds for CAFOD through activities chosen by the pupils
- Raising funds for charities chosen because of special links to the children within each of the schools or the Trust such as McMillian, Sue Ryder or HCPT
- Sending Christmas cards to elderly parishioners or those who are lonely
- Doing small acts with great love, inspired by our trust saint, that make a big difference to live out our Trust mission

Pupils are always encouraged to help each other as well as their parents, teachers and other people in the community. It is our aim that our whole Trust ethos is one that will foster and nurture a generous giving of self, and an appreciation and respect for others.

Working for Social Justice

Pupils are also taught the importance of standing up for social justice as an important aspect of Christian life. There are planned opportunities for pupils to engage in campaigns for social justice such as:

- Writing to local MPs to join with campaigns
- Celebrating Refugee Week
- Climate change activities e.g. Switch off fortnight
- Supporting Fairtrade Fortnight
- Reduce, reuse, recycle awareness
- Running soup kitchens to raise awareness and help others

Chaplaincy

The spirituality and prayer life of each Trust school are an evident part of its Catholic life and mission. The LWCET Prayer and Liturgy policy details the school provision. Chaplaincy provision within the Trust plays an important role in the spiritual and moral development of the whole community.

Each school Chaplaincy Team consists of a member of the Senior Leadership Team and a number of pupil representatives from different year groups.

Their role is to support each member of the school communities to grow in their faith and to be part of the pastoral care system in each school. They do this by:

- Maintaining and developing class prayer areas
- Maintaining and developing communal prayer areas
- Writing and leading prayers during whole school acts of worship
- Offering opportunities for informal pupil led prayer during break or lunch times
- Organising retreat days, days of recollection
- Keeping the pupils updated with information about donations to charity, such as for foodbanks and CAFOD
- Being a role model to others by modelling reverence and joy where applicable
- Writing and leading whole school acts of worship
- Accompanying members of the school community, especially in times of need

Our School Communities

Each LWCET school is a welcoming place for children, families and members of staff from all faiths and none. Recognising that Christ is at the centre of our schools we strive to support and value each member, especially the most vulnerable.

Each school's Behaviour policy is driven by a belief that all are unique and made in God's image and likeness. See individual school policies.

Children and staff within the Trust are encouraged to engage with a range of awards that recognise the work that our schools do to implement Catholic Social Teaching. Across the Trust, these include: Live Simply, Eco schools, Faith in Action, Rights Respecting, Fairtrade.

Each school recognises that it is part of a family of Catholic schools and works collaboratively with local Catholic schools in the Little Way Catholic Educational Trust, our Gloucestershire Partnership and across the diocese. Through work in RE, our children learn about the Universal Church and how we belong to a global family.

Within LWCET, all are encouraged to live life to the full and reach their full potential. Members of staff have opportunities to take part in the diocesan continuing professional development and formation programmes. New teachers are enrolled on the New to Catholic Education Programme and new Head Teachers have an allocated mentor as part of their induction to teaching or leading in a Catholic school.

Parents

Parents are the first teachers of their children and we work in partnership with them. They are encouraged to support Religious Education lessons by helping their children complete tasks set and discuss with their children work being completed when preparing to receive the Sacraments.

We ask parents whose children are of other faiths to share their religious celebrations with their child's school so that we can all learn together about key parts of their faith year and support those community members who are of other faiths.

Parents are invited to attend a variety of school events throughout the year, which include: parent review sessions, whole school Masses and liturgical prayers which take place throughout the year both in school and at some of our parish churches and events such as Christmas services and celebrations.

Parents are encouraged to join with each of our schools to help organise and host a range of events for their school community. All funds raised support and enhance the provision the school offers for their pupils and families. This is also an important way to immerse themselves in their school community.

Parents are encouraged to share their views through questionnaires, as well as at parent meetings. Our Trust schools operate an open-door policy and there is always a senior leader available at the start and end of each school day.

Parish Links

Links with each school's local parish are a vital part of Catholic life in our schools. We actively encourage each of our schools to be an active part of parish life and to have a close working relationship with the clergy in their linked parishes.

The children know who the Parish Priest is because they visit the church or welcome the priest into school and refer to him during Celebration of the Word.

Each Trust school supports the work of their parish/es by participating in events at the parish and supporting local groups which include: Justice and Peace group, St Vincent de Paul, foodbanks and running warm spaces. Parish newsletters are also shared with our school communities as well as invitations and encouragement for our children to attend parish events and Mass.

The Coordinator for Catholic Life and Mission

The Coordinator for Catholic life and mission is the Headteacher. A job description for this role can be found at Appendix A. Pro-formas for monitoring Catholic Life and Mission and to support the coordinator in carrying out their role can also be found at Appendix B.

Policy Monitoring and Review

This policy is monitored by the Catholic Life and Mission Coordinator and is evaluated and reviewed in the usual way with other LWCET schools every three years to include all schools, their staff, their children and their governors. The Foundation Governors of each Local Governing Committee, in particular, will play a most important role.



Appendix A

The Role of the Coordinator for Catholic Life and Mission in LWCET schools

- Formulating a written policy for Catholic Life and Mission and reviewing alongside the staff, children, governors regularly in collaboration with the Trust SLT
- Ensuring that there is a development plan for Catholic Life and Mission included in the school development plan
- Ensuring that pupils are able to explain the Catholic life and mission of the school, appropriate to their age, aptitudes and faith backgrounds
- Liaising with chaplaincy team to organise themes for outreach, timetable of charitable support, involvement in campaigns
- Developing staff confidence and expertise and enabling them to articulate the mission of the school and its impact on life
- Working alongside coordinators for RE and Collective Worship

Planning, recording, monitoring and evaluating

- Maintaining and developing effective procedures and documentation for planning, recording, monitoring and evaluating
- Together with the Chaplaincy Team, planning school involvement in national and local projects e.g. the environment
- Use a global planner to ensure relevant days are marked in school e.g. Holocaust Memorial Day
- Making judgements on outcomes, provision and leadership of Catholic Life and Mission to inform the ongoing work on the school Catholic Self-Evaluation Document (CSED)
- Involve children in monitoring and evaluating the Catholic Life and Mission of the school

Communication

- Communicating to members of the school community the significance of Catholic Life and Mission in the life of a Catholic school
- Reporting to and consulting with the governors regarding matters of concern and development
- Acting as consultant to colleagues
- Encouraging positive attitudes towards Catholic Life and Mission
- Through the induction process, informing newly appointed colleagues of school policy regarding Catholic Life and Mission
- Communicating with parents, governors and the parish community
- Liaison with the school Chaplain/Chaplaincy team
- Liaison with the Diocesan Department for schools and colleges.

Professional development/Ongoing formation

Leading and organising in-service training and ongoing formation on the Catholic Life and Mission of the school

- Attending appropriate in-service courses and feeding back to school community
- Keeping up to date with encyclicals and diocesan information to support formation of others

Resources

- Evaluating existing resources and contacts
- Ensuring resources are available to promote the Catholic Life and Mission of the school
- Budgeting efficiently
